Lendingkart Finance Limited: Provisional [ICRA]A(SO) assigned to PTC Series A1 and Provisional [ICRA]A-(SO) assigned to PTC Series A2 issued by Nimbus 2023 SBL Lima, backed by a pool of unsecured small business loans

Rationale

ICRA has assigned a Provisional [ICRA]A(SO) rating to the pass-through certificates (PTCs) Series A1 and a Provisional [ICRA]A-(SO) rating to PTC Series A2 issued under a securitisation transaction originated by Lendingkart Finance Limited {Lendingkart; rated [ICRA]BBB+ (Stable)}. The PTCs are backed by receivables from a Rs. 22.30-crore (pool principal amount of Rs. 16.89 crore) pool of unsecured small business loans (SBLs).

The provisional ratings are based on the strength of the cash flows from the selected pool of contracts, the credit enhancement (CE) available in the form of (i) a cash collateral (CC) of 5.00% of the pool principal to be provided by the originator, (ii) subordination of 15.00% of the pool principal for PTC Series A1 and 9.00% of the pool principal for PTC Series A2 and (iii) excess interest spread (EIS) in the structure of 20.72% for PTC Series A1 and 18.98% for PTC Series A2. The provisional ratings are also based on the integrity of the legal structure. The provisional ratings are subject to the fulfilment of all the conditions under the structure and the review of the documentation pertaining to the transaction by ICRA.

Key rating drivers

Credit strengths

- Availability of CE in the form of EIS, subordination and CC
- Absence of overdue contracts as on pool cut-off date

Credit challenges

- Higher share of high IRR contracts with ~35% share of contracts having IRR greater than 30%
- Exposure to interest rate risk given that the yield on PTC Series A1 is floating and the pool yield is fixed
- The portfolio had seen stress in asset quality due to Covid-19 pandemic as reflected in higher restructuring and write offs
- Exposed to inherent credit risk associated with the unsecured nature of the asset class; performance of the pool would remain exposed to macro-economic shocks/business disruptions

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Description of key rating drivers highlighted above

The first line of support for PTC Series A1 in the transaction is in the form of a subordination/over-collateralisation of 15.00% of the pool principal (includes the principal payable to PTC Series A2). After PTC Series A1 has been fully paid, subordination of 9.00% of the pool principal could be available for PTC Series A2. The equity tranche PTC payouts are completely subordinated to the PTC Series A1 and PTC Series A2 payouts and the equity tranche principal payments are not promised at every payout. On the payment of PTC Series A1 and PTC Series A2 in full, the principal payments for the equity tranche PTCs will be made. Further credit support is available in the form of an EIS of 20.72% for PTC Series A1 and 18.98% for PTC Series A2. A CC of 5.00% of the initial pool principal, to be provided by Lendingkart, would act as further CE in the transaction. In the event of a shortfall in meeting the promised PTC payouts during any month, the Trustee will utilise the CC to meet the same.

As per the transaction structure, PTC Series A2 payouts are completely subordinated to PTC Series A1. The collections from the pool, after making the promised interest payouts to PTC Series A1, will be used to make the expected principal payouts to PTC Series A1, followed by the expected interest payout to PTC Series A2. The entire principal repayment to PTC Series A1 is promised on the scheduled maturity date. Post the maturity of PTC Series A1, interest payouts will be promised to PTC Series A2 and all excess cash flows, after meeting the promised interest PTC Series A2 payouts, will be passed on for the expected PTC Series A2 principal payout. The entire principal repayment to PTC Series A2 is promised on the scheduled maturity date. The EIS available after meeting the expected and promised PTC payments will flow back to the originator on a monthly basis. While the loans in the underlying pool are all fixed rate loans, the yield for PTC Series A1 is not fixed but linked to the reporate, thereby exposing the transaction to interest rate risk. The PTC Series A2 has a fixed yield.

There are no overdues in the pool as on the cut-off date. The geographical concentration of the loan contracts in the current pool is moderate with the top 3 states constituting ~35% of the pool principal. The pool consists of monthly paying loan contracts, with moderate weighted average seasoning (~9 months) and pre-securitisation amortisation (~19%). The pool has a low share of contracts (~11%) with a ticket size of more than Rs. 10 lakh. Further the CIBIL score of almost all the contracts is above 700. The pool has relatively higher share of high IRR contracts with ~35% share of contracts having IRR greater than 30%. The pool would be exposed to the inherent credit risk associated with the unsecured nature of the asset class and its performance would remain exposed to macro-economic shocks/business disruptions.

Performance of past rated pools: ICRA has rated 39 pools originated by Lendingkart. The performance of the live pools (which have completed at least 2 months post securitisation) has been healthy till date with the cumulative collection efficiency in the range of 94-99% for all the transactions. No CC has been utilised till the March 2023 payout.

Key rating assumptions

ICRA's cash flow modelling for rating asset-backed securitisation (ABS) transactions involves the simulation of potential delinquencies, losses (shortfall in principal collection during the tenor of the pool) and prepayments in the pool. The assumptions for the loss and coefficient of variation (CoV) are arrived at after taking into account the performance of the originator's portfolio as well as the characteristics of the specific pool being evaluated. Additionally, the assumptions may be adjusted to factor in the current operating environment and any industry-specific factors that ICRA believes could impact the performance of the underlying pool of contracts.

After making these adjustments, the expected mean shortfall in principal collection during the tenure of the pool is estimated at 6.00-7.00% of the initial pool principal, with certain variability around it. The prepayment rate for the underlying pool is estimated in the range of 6.0-18.0% per annum.

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Liquidity position: Strong

As per the transaction structure, only the interest amount is promised to the PTC Series A1 holders on a monthly basis while the principal amount is promised on the scheduled maturity date of the transaction. After PTC Series A1 is fully paid, the interest amount is promised to the PTC Series A2 holders on a monthly basis and the principal amount is promised on the scheduled maturity date of the transaction. The collections from the pool and the available CE are expected to be comfortable to meet the promised payouts to the PTC investors.

Rating sensitivities

Positive factors – The ratings could be upgraded on the sustained strong collection performance of the underlying pool of contracts (monthly collection efficiency >95%), leading to lower-than-expected delinquency levels, and on an increase in the cover available for future investor payouts from the CE.

Negative factors – The ratings could be downgraded on the sustained weak collection performance of the underlying pool of contracts (monthly collection efficiency <90%), leading to higher-than-expected delinquency levels and CE utilisation levels.

Analytical approach

The rating action is based on the analysis of the performance of Lendingkart's portfolio till December 2022, the key characteristics and composition of the current pool, the performance expected over the balance tenure of the pool, and the CE cover available in the transaction.

Validity of the provisional rating

The Trust is expected to complete the pending actions/execute the pending documents in the near term. However, in case of continued pendency of the actions/documents beyond one year of this publication, the provisional ratings would be withdrawn for the transaction even if the instrument has been issued.

Risks associated with the provisional rating

In case the issuance is completed, but the pending actions/documents are not completed for the transaction within one year (validity period) from the assignment of the rating, the provisional ratings will be withdrawn in accordance with ICRA's Policy on Provisional Ratings available at www.icra.in.

About the originator

Lendingkart provides unsecured small and medium-sized enterprise (SME) loans. Lendingkart Technologies Private Limited (LTPL), the technology arm of the Ahmedabad-based Lendingkart Group, holds a 100% stake in Lendingkart. Fullerton Financial



Holdings Pte Limited (FFH) had a 39.15% stake in LTPL as on March 31, 2022. The Group was started in 2014 by one of the cofounders, Mr. Harshvardhan Lunia, and raised funds from FFH, Saama Capital, Mayfield India, India Quotient, Bertelsmann India Investments, Sistema Asia Fund and Darrin Capital Management.

The Lendingkart Group is a part of the rapidly evolving fintech industry and it leverages technology to underwrite credit to extend loans to the SME segment, which distinguishes its algorithm-driven credit capabilities from the physical credit underwriting performed by various industry players. Loans are given to micro and small enterprises for meeting their working capital needs. The underwriting is based on the scoring by a proprietary algorithm.
