Shriram Finance Limited: Ratings upgraded for PTCs backed by commercial vehicle, equipment and tractor loan securitisation transactions

Rationale

The pass-through certificates (PTCs) are backed by commercial vehicle, construction equipment and tractor loan receivables originated by Shriram Finance Limited {SFL; rated [ICRA]AAA (Stable)}.

The ratings upgrade factors in the build-up of the credit enhancement cover on account of amortisation and healthy pool performance. The ratings also draw comfort from the fact that the breakeven collection efficiency is comfortably below the actual collection level observed in the pools till the March 2026 payout month.

Transaction structure

Sansar Feb 2025 Trust

The transaction has a two-tranche structure, wherein Series A1 PTC will be equivalent to 95% of the initial pool principal and Series A2 PTC, equivalent to 5% of the initial pool principal, which will be subordinated to the Series A1 PTC. As per the transaction structure, the monthly cash flow schedule comprises the promised interest payout to Series A1 PTC. The principal is expected to be paid on a monthly basis (100% of the pool principal billed) firstly to PTC Series A1 and then to PTC Series A2 (post PTC Series A1 is fully paid off).

Any surplus EIS, after meeting the promised and expected payouts, will flow back to the Originator on a monthly basis. Any prepayment in the pool would be used for the prepayment of Series A1 PTC principal (and to Series A2 PTC post PTC Series A1 is fully paid off).

Sansar March 2025 Trust

The transaction has a two-tranche structure, wherein PTC Series A will be equivalent to 93% of the initial pool principal while the equity tranche, equivalent to 7% of the initial pool principal, will be subordinated to PTC Series A. As per the transaction structure, the monthly cash flow schedule comprises the promised interest payout to PTC Series A. The principal is expected to be paid on a monthly basis (100% of the pool principal billed) firstly to PTC Series A and then to the equity tranche (after PTC Series A is fully paid off). Any surplus excess interest spread (EIS), after meeting the promised and expected payouts, will flow back to the Originator on a monthly basis. Any prepayment in the pool would be used for the prepayment of the PTC Series A principal (and to the equity tranches after PTC Series A is fully paid off).

Key rating drivers and their description

Credit strengths

Adequate servicing capability of SFL - SFL, which is also servicing the loans in the transaction, has a well-established track record in the pre-owned commercial vehicle financing business of more than four decades and has adequate underwriting policies and collection procedures across a wide geography. It also has satisfactory processes for servicing the loan accounts in the securitised pool.

Build-up of credit enhancement available in the structure – The rating factors in the build-up in the credit enhancement with CC increasing to 8.53% of the balance pool principal for Sansar Feb 2025 Trust and to 4.48% for Sansar March 2025 Trust. Internal credit support is also available through EIS and subordination for the transactions.

Healthy pool performance – Delinquencies in the harder bucket with the loss-cum-90+ days past due (dpd; as percentage of initial pool principal) and loss-cum-180+ dpd have remained low at 0.17% and 0.10%, respectively for Sansar Feb 2025 Trust and at 0.14% and 0.09%, respectively for Sansar March 2025 Trust. The performance of the pools has been healthy with cumulative collection efficiency (including advances) upwards of ~99.9% and 100.9% respectively for both Sansar Feb 2025 Trust and Sansar March 2025 Trust till March 2026 payout month while the breakeven collection efficiency remains comfortably below the monthly collection efficiency.

Credit challenges

Risks associated with lending business – The pools’ performance would remain exposed to macro-economic shocks, business disruptions and natural calamities that may impact the income-generating capability of the borrowers and their ability to make timely repayments of their loans.

Key rating assumptions

ICRA’s cash flow modelling for the surveillance of asset-backed securitisation (ABS) transactions involves the simulation of potential delinquencies, losses (shortfall in principal collection during the balance tenor of the pool) and prepayments in the pool. The assumptions for the loss and coefficient of variation (CoV) are arrived at after considering the past performance of the Originator’s portfolio and the rated pools, as well as the performance and characteristics of the specific pool being evaluated. Additionally, the assumptions may be adjusted to factor in the current operating environment and any industry-specific factors that ICRA believes could impact the performance of the underlying pool of contracts.

ICRA has estimated the shortfall in the pool principal collection during its tenure at 1.75% and 2.50% for Sansar Feb 2025 Trust and Sansar March 2025 Trust with certain variability around it. The average prepayment rate for both the underlying pools is modelled in the range of 4.8% to 18.0% per annum. Various possible scenarios have been simulated at stressed loss levels and prepayment rates and the incidences of default to the investor as well as the extent of losses are measured after factoring in the credit enhancement to arrive at the final ratings for the instruments.

Liquidity position

Sansar Feb 2025 Trust

Superior for Series A1 PTC

The liquidity for the instrument is superior after factoring in the credit enhancement available to meet the promised payout to the investor. The total credit enhancement is 7.0 times the estimated loss for the pool for Series A1 PTC.

Strong for Series A2 PTC

The liquidity for the instrument is strong after factoring in the credit enhancement available to meet the promised payout to the investor. The total credit enhancement is 4.25 times the estimated loss for the pool for Series A2 PTC.

Sansar March 2025 Trust

Strong for PTC Series A

The liquidity for the instrument is strong after factoring in the credit enhancement available to meet the promised payout to the investor. The total credit enhancement is 5.50 times the estimated loss for the pool for Series A1 PTC.

Adequate for Equity Tranche

The liquidity for the instrument is adequate after factoring in the credit enhancement available to meet the promised payout to the investor. The total credit enhancement is 2.75 times the estimated loss for the pool for Equity Tranche.

Rating sensitivities

Sansar Feb 2025 Trust

Positive factors – Not applicable for Series A1 PTC; For Series A2 PTC – The rating can be upgraded on the sustained strong collection performance of the underlying pool of contracts, resulting in an increase in the credit enhancement cover available.

Negative factors – Pressure on the ratings could emerge on sustained weak collections, resulting in higher-than-expected delinquency levels. Weakening in the credit profile of the servicer (SFL) could also exert pressure on the ratings.

Sansar March 2025 Trust

Positive factors – Not applicable for PTC Series A; For Equity Tranche – The rating can be upgraded on the sustained strong collection performance of the underlying pool of contracts, resulting in an increase in the credit enhancement cover available.

Negative factors – Pressure on the ratings could emerge on sustained weak collections, resulting in higher-than-expected delinquency levels. Weakening in the credit profile of the servicer (SFL) could also exert pressure on the ratings.

Analytical approach

The rating action is based on the performance of the pools till March 2026 (payout month), the present delinquency levels and the credit enhancement available in the pools, and the performance expected over the balance tenure of the pools.

About the originator

Shriram Finance Limited [SFL; erstwhile Shriram Transport Finance Company Limited (STFC)], incorporated in 1979, is a part of the Shriram Group of companies and an upper layer non-banking financial company (NBFC). Based on the National Company Law Tribunal (NCLT) order dated November 14, 2022, the operations of Shriram City Union Finance Limited (SCUF) and Shriram Capital Limited were merged with STFC, which was rechristened Shriram Finance Limited on November 30, 2022.

SFL enjoys a leadership position in preowned commercial vehicle finance and has a pan-India presence with more than 3,700 branches and other offices. As on December 31, 2025, SFL had a standalone AUM of Rs. 2.92 lakh crore comprising commercial vehicle finance (46%), passenger vehicle finance (22%), loans to micro, small and medium-sized enterprises (MSMEs; 14%), construction equipment and farm equipment finance (7%), two-wheeler loans (6%), personal loans (3%) and gold loans (2%).

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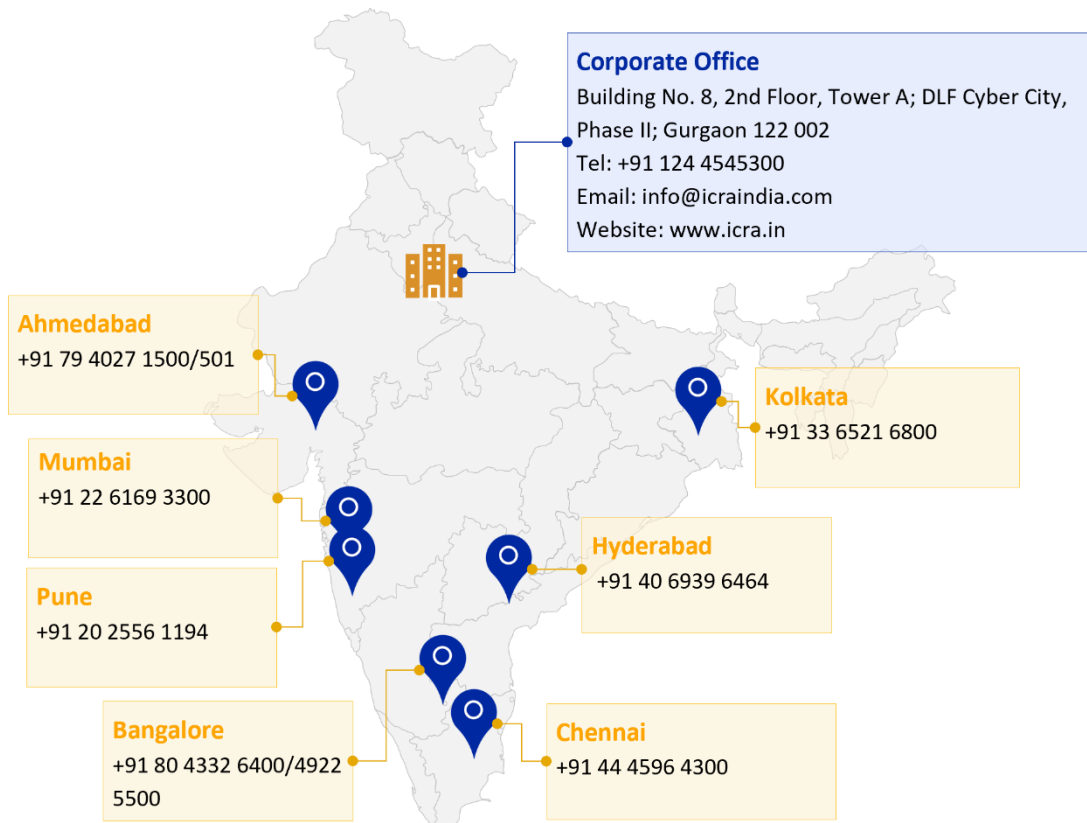
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
